"For where envying and strife is, there is confusion and every evil work" (James 3:16). Jealousy brings on covetousness which can be avoided by starting to think differently. Changing the way you think can change the way you feel and act. Jealousy is a combination of fear and anger, fear of losing something and anger that someone is moving in on something that you feel belongs only to you. A feeling of low self-esteem or insecurity can contribute to jealousy. Cain was jealous of his brother Abel because his sacrifice was not accepted by God. That was anger on Cain's part. The covetousness of Ahab was great. His eyes coveted the vineyard of Naboth. It displeased Ahab because Naboth would not give him the inheritance of his fathers. Ahab's spirit was therefore sad, and he ate no bread. Because of all this, his wife Jezebel wrote letters in his name and sealed them with his seal. She sent them unto the elders and to the nobles that were in his city dwelling with Naboth. She wrote in the letters, "...Proclaim a fast, and set Naboth on high among the people: And set two men, sons of Belial, before him, to bear witness against him, saying, Thou didst blaspheme God and the king. And then carry him out, and stone him, that he may die" (I Kings 21:9-10). The order was granted in the letter, and Naboth was stoned to death as it was

written. "And it came to pass, when Ahab heard that Naboth was dead, that Ahab rose up to go down to the vineyard of Naboth the Jezreelite, to take possession of it" (verse 16).

"Let your conversation be without covetousness; and be content with such things as ye have: for he hath said, I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee" (Hebrews 13:5). Covetousness will come across when you are not satisfied with the blessings God has bestowed upon you. A deep desire to obtain a possession of another person can be defined as covetousness. The Word of God clearly lets us know that we, as Christians, should never covet anything that belongs to another person whether house, wife, servant, ox or ass.

Covetousness has been a problem with man from the beginning of Creation. It contributed to the fall of Adam and Eve, which led them to stealing. Please read Genesis 3:1-6. Ananias and Sapphira, his wife, were very covetous. They "...sold a possession, And kept back part of the price, his wife also being privy to it, and brought a certain part, and laid it at the apostles' feet." Ananias allowed Satan to fill his heart to lie to the Holy Ghost and to keep back part of the price of the land. But Ananias was not lying unto men, but unto God. He and his wife, Sapphira, agreed together to tempt the Spirit of the Lord, but the feet of them which buried her husband carried her out the door. She fell down straightway, and yielded up the ghost, and the young men "...buried her by her husband". Please read Acts 5:1-10. Ananias and Sapphira coveted, lied and stole. Greed at times can cost us our lives. Covetousness cost Ananias and Sapphira their lives.

"And he said unto them, Take heed, and beware of covetousness: for a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth" (Luke 12:15). Let us not set our hearts on things on the earth, but lay all of our treasures up in heaven. Our desire for things of this life must be controlled by the Holy Spirit, because in these last days covetousness is great. "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (Matthew 6:21). "For the wicked boasteth of his heart's desire, and blesseth the covetous, whom the LORD abhorreth" (Psalm 10:3).

Envy is the feeling that one has against another person who is seen to be better than one's self. We hate seeing someone that is more prosperous and wealthy than we are. Malice is a need to see others suffer. It comes across with a grudge against a person because he has done good to someone whom we hate. "Let all bitterness, and wrath, and anger, and clamour, and evil speaking, be put away from you, with all malice: And be ye kind one to another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake hath forgiven you" (Ephesians 4:31-32).

"But of him are ye in Christ Jesus, who of God is made unto us wisdom, and righteousness, and sanctification, and redemption: That, according as it is written, He that glorieth, let him glory in the Lord" (I Corinthians 1:30-31). The Apostle Peter explained that our Lord Jesus was God's wonderful gift to his human creation. "For Christ also hath once suffered for sins, the just for the unjust, that he might bring us to God, being put to death in the flesh, but quickened by the

Spirit" (I Peter 3:18).

The Apostle Paul – A True Example Of Thankfulness

Let us be inspired by the zeal and determination of the Apostle Paul. He wrote, "For I am persuaded, that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come, Nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature, shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 8:38-39).

Many of God's servants endured hardships, but their hearts were filled with thankfulness. This is especially true with the Apostle Paul. He wrote, "But we have this treasure in earthen vessels, that the excellency of the power may be of God, and not of us. We are troubled on every side, yet not distressed; we are perplexed, but not in despair; Persecuted, but not forsaken; cast down, but not destroyed; Always bearing about in the body the dying of the Lord Jesus, that the life also of Jesus might be made manifest in our body. For we which live are alway delivered unto death for Jesus' sake, that the life also of Jesus might be made manifest in our mortal flesh" (II Corinthians 4:7-11).

Few of the Lord's people have suffered more for the

gospel than the Apostle Paul. However, there is no indication of complaint in his writings which form a major part of the New Testament. Also in his letter to the Corinthian brethren, he explained, "Knowing that he which raised up the Lord Jesus shall raise up us also by Jesus, and shall present us with you. For all things are for your sakes, that the abundant grace might through the thanksgiving of many redound to the glory of God. For which cause we faint not; but though our outward man perish, yet the inward man is renewed day by day. For our light affliction, which is but for a moment, worketh for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory; While we look not at the things which are seen, but at the things which are not seen: for the things which are seen are temporal; but the things which are not seen are eternal" (verses 14-18).

Readily, the apostle accepted his duty in the service of our Lord. We know that this service brought him almost continuous suffering and trial which at times nearly cost him his life. He did not waver from his commitment, and he continued serving the Lord and his brethren with his heart filled with thanksgiving and devotion to God.

Like the Apostle Paul, let us give sincere heartfelt praise and thanksgiving to God for all His blessings and benefits He gives to us!

Four Things One Must Know Before Becoming A Child Of God

Number One: "For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23). "As it is written, There is none righteous, no, not one" (Romans 3:10). "All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned every one to his own way; and the LORD hath laid on him the iniquity of us all" (Isaiah 53:6). "But we are all as an unclean thing, and all our righteousnesses are as filthy rags; and we all do fade as a leaf; and our iniquities, like the wind, have taken us away" (Isaiah 64:6). "Behold, I was

shapen in iniquity; and in sin did my mother conceive me" (Psalm 51:5).

Number Two: The best you can do – won't do! "Not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to his mercy he saved us, by the washing of regeneration, and renewing of the Holy Ghost" (Titus 3:5). "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: Not of works, lest any man should boast" (Ephesians 2:8-9).

The question is directly asked and directly answered in Acts 16:30-31: "And brought them out, and said, Sirs, what must I do to be saved? And they said, Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved, and thy house." "Knowing that a man is not justified by the works of the law, but by the faith of Jesus Christ, even we have believed in Jesus Christ, that we might be justified by the faith of Christ, and not by the works of the law: for by the works of the law shall no flesh be justified" (Galatians 2:16).

Number Three: Every sinner needs to know "...that Christ died for our sins according to the scriptures" (I Corinthians 15:3). "... And if any man sin, we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous" (I John 2:1). "For there is one God, and one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus" (I Timothy 2:5). "Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved" (Acts 4:12). "That if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved. For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness; and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation" (Romans 10:9-10). "Jesus saith unto him, I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by me" (John 14:6).

Suppose you were in the third floor of a burning building, and the black smoke was boiling into your room and the hallways, and a friendly fireman with a big ladder knocked at your window and said, "Come with me." Would you say, "Well, let me try the door: Why not use the elevator? Why not go down the stairway?" Finally you are convinced that your only hope of escape is to get on the ladder and go down with the fireman and land on the ground safely. You found out that the fireman was the way.

Why plunge into the water in New York Harbor to swim to London, England through big waves and water that is filled with man-eating sharks when a rich man is ready to pay your fare on the Queen Mary? Why want to do it your way when your way will not work, because it is not "Do" – it's "Done." Jesus said on the cross, "It is finished." "But as many as received him, to them gave he power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on his name" (John 1:12). "For whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved" (Romans

10:13). "Verily, verily, I say unto you, He that heareth my word, and believeth on him that sent me, hath everlasting life, and shall not come into condemnation; but is passed from death unto life" (John 5:24). "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life" (John 3:16). "... and him that cometh to me I will in no wise cast out" (John 6:37). "Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28). "Being born again, not of corruptible seed, but of incorruptible, by the word of God, which liveth and abideth for ever" (I Peter 1:23).

Number Four: You MUST know that today is the day, and now is the time.

A man lost in a snow storm finally ran out of physical strength and fell. The next morning, he was found dead at his own doorstep. If he had fallen with his hand stretched out, he would have touched the bottom step. He was so near, and yet so far away. "Seek ye the LORD while he may be found, call ye upon him while he is near" (Isaiah 55:6). "Boast not thyself of tomorrow; for thou knowest not what a day may bring forth" (Proverbs 27:1). ("... now is the accepted time; behold, now is the day of salvation") (II Corinthians 6:2). "Whereas ye know not what shall be on the morrow. For what is your life? It is even a vapour, that appeareth for a little time, and then vanisheth away" (James 4:14).

For they sleep not, except they have done mischief; and their sleep is taken away, unless they cause some to fall. For they eat the bread of wickedness, and drink the wine of violence" (Proverbs 4:14-17).

"Blessed is the man that walketh not in the counsel of the ungodly, nor standeth in the way of sinners, nor sitteth in the seat of the scornful" (Psalm 1:1).

The Apostle Paul wrote to the church at Philippi: ("For many walk, of whom I have told you often, and now tell you even weeping, that they are the enemies of the cross of Christ: Whose end is destruction, whose God is their belly, and whose glory is in their shame, who mind earthly things") (Philippians 3:18-19).

The following are some of the things that parents can do to keep their children from the wrong crowds. Parents, don't drop your children off at the movies or a party unless they are with kids you have learned to trust as the right crowd. Don't drop your children off at youth programs unless there is adequate adult supervision for keeping them where they belong ...and out of empty rooms.

The Good Father

"Children, obey your parents in the Lord: for this is right" (Ephesians 6:1). The key word here is "obey". "...Behold, to obey is better than sacrifice, and to hearken than the fat of rams" (I Samuel 15:22, last part). "For rebellion is as the sin of witchcraft, and stubbornness is as iniquity and idolatry..." (verse 23, first part). We must realize that if we disobey our parents and become rebellious and stubborn, it is as if we indulge in witchcraft, iniquity and idolatry. The fifth commandment which was written with God's own finger states, "Honour thy father and thy mother: that thy days may be long upon the land which the Lord thy God giveth thee" (Exodus 20:12).

The Good Father commanded Saul to utterly destroy all the Amalekites consisting of both man and woman, infant and suckling, ox and sheep, camel and ass. "But Saul and the people spared Agag, and the best of the sheep, and of the oxen, and of the fatlings, and the lambs, and all that was good, and would not utterly destroy them: but every thing that was vile and refuse, that they destroyed utterly. Then came the word of the LORD unto Samuel, saying, It repenteth me that I have set up Saul to be king: for he is turned back from following me, and hath not performed my commandments. And it grieved Samuel; and he cried unto the LORD all night" (I Samuel 15:9-11). "Then Samuel said unto Saul, Stay, and I will tell thee what the LORD hath said to me this night. And he said unto him, Say on. And Samuel said, When thou wast little in thine own sight, wast thou not made the head of the tribes of Israel, and the LORD anointed thee king over Israel? And the LORD sent thee on a journey, and said, Go and utterly destroy the sinners the Amalekites, and fight against them until they be consumed. Wherefore then didst thou not obey the voice of the LORD, but didst fly upon the spoil, and didst evil in the sight of the LORD?" (I Samuel 15:16-19) "And Samuel said unto him, The LORD hath rent the kingdom of Israel from thee this day, and hath given it to a neighbour of thine, that is better than thou" (verse 28).

Because of disobedience, that same Saul whom God sent Samuel to anoint to be king over Israel was rejected by God, Himself, for God had taken the kingdom back from him and given it to another which was better than him. Thus, as children of God and as children in a home, we must be very careful because God loves us more than our parents, because some parents compromise with our wrong doings, but God does not compromise nor is He a respecter of persons. The Psalmist David declared, "When my father and my mother forsake me, then the LORD will take me up" (Psalm 27:10). Isaiah, the prophet wrote, "Can a woman forget her suckling child, that she should not have compassion on the son of her womb? yea, they may forget, yet will I not forget thee" (Isaiah 49:15). "Let us hear the conclusion of the whole matter: Fear God, and keep his commandments: for this is the whole duty of man. For God shall bring every work into judgment, with every secret thing, whether it be good or whether it be evil" (Ecclesiastes 12:13-14).

Brother Francis from Grenada always admonished

us that children of God take no chances, and our heavenly Father grants us two ways. Therefore He says to us, "I call heaven and earth to record this day against you, that I have set before you life and death, blessing and cursing: therefore choose life, that both thou and thy seed may live" (Deuteronomy 30:19).

Children, let us remember Lot who chose the best part of the land, but it was not the best part in which to dwell. Sometimes when we look around us and see the things that our neighbors have, we start to become envious, but we must remember that our heavenly Father owns it all, and more likely He will give it to us according to our needs. God and Abraham had such a relationship that before God destroyed Sodom and Gomorrah, He made it known unto Abraham what was His plan for that city. "And the LORD said, Shall I hide from Abraham that thing which I do; Seeing that Abraham shall surely become a great and mighty nation, and all the nations of the earth shall be blessed in him? (Genesis 18:17-18) "And the LORD said, Because the cry of Sodom and Gomorrah is great, and because their sin is very grievous; I will go down now, and see whether they have done altogether according to the cry of it, which is come upon me; and if not, I will know" (verses 20-21). "And Abraham drew near, and said, Wilt thou also destroy the righteous with the wicked?" (verse 23). We saw where God and Abraham communicated together. Abraham kept the count down even unto ten. "And he said, Oh let not the Lord be angry, and I will speak yet but this once: Peradventure ten shall be found there. And he said, I will not destroy it for ten's sake" (verse 32).

"Enter ye in at the strait gate: for wide is the gate, and broad is the way, that leadeth to destruction, and many there be which go in thereat: Because strait is the gate, and narrow is the way, which leadeth unto life, and few there be that find it" (Matthew 7:13-14).

Here, the Lord shows us that few will find the narrow way, but let us be ones who find it. When we find it, no matter how green the grass looks elsewhere, please do not launch out. Launching out, though, was very good for the fishermen. When Jesus was at the lake of Gennesaret, after He finished His sermon, He said unto Simon, "...Launch out into the deep, and let down your nets for a draught" (Luke 5:4, last part). "And Simon

answering said unto him, Master, we have toiled all the night, and have taken nothing: nevertheless at thy word I will let down the net. And when they had this done, they inclosed a great multitude of fishes: and their net brake. And they beckoned unto their partners, which were in the other ship, that they should come and help them. And they came, and filled both the ships, so that they began to sink. When Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, Depart from me; for I am a sinful man, O Lord" (verses 5-8).

We see that Peter obeyed the Lord and launched out, which was good for them. However, launching out can be detrimental for us because the Apostle John encourages us to, "Love not the world, neither the things that are in the world. If any man love the world, the love of the Father is not in him. For all that is in the world, the lust of the flesh, and the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life, is not of the Father, but is of the world. And the world passeth away, and the lust thereof: but he that doeth the will of God abideth for ever" (I John 2:15-17).

Simon Peter and his fellows had toiled all night but didn't catch any fish. Thus, they had need. The Lord saw the need and had compassion on them when He granted them a miracle.

Since commandment number five is a commandment with a promise, let us do the honors that we may be honored or rewarded. "Ask, and it shall be given you; seek, and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you: For every one that asketh receiveth; and he that seeketh findeth; and to him that knocketh it shall be opened. Or what man is there of you, whom if his son ask bread, will he give him a stone? Or if he ask a fish, will he give him a serpent? If ye then, being evil, know how to give good gifts unto your children, how much more shall your Father which is in heaven give good things to them that ask him?" (Matthew 7:7-11)

Since our parents will ensure that we have the physical things that we have need of, let us therefore be obedient unto them and also unto our heavenly Father, that we may be able to gain the spiritual gifts which our heavenly Father has in store for us. Always remember that, "The eyes of the LORD are in every place, beholding the evil and the good" (Proverbs 15:3).

The Seven Churches--(Part One)

In this article, we will not be examining whether the seven churches of Revelation are time periods in history, or whether they represent churches in our day. Rather, we will examine the messages given to each of the churches so that we may apply this teaching to our own lives. These seven churches existed in the Apostle John's time and, geographically, they formed a rough circle in the western part of Asia Minor. The Lord chose these particular churches as examples of the successes and failures that could be in every church of God.

"Unto the angel of the church of Ephesus write; These things saith he that holdeth the seven stars in his right hand, who walketh in the midst of the seven golden candlesticks; I know thy works, and thy labour, and thy patience, and how thou canst not bear them which are evil: and thou hast tried them which say they are apostles, and are not, and hast found them liars: And hast borne, and hast patience, and for my name's sake hast laboured, and hast not fainted. Nevertheless I have somewhat against thee, because thou hast left thy first love. Remember therefore from whence thou art fallen, and repent, and do the first works; or else I will come unto thee quickly, and will remove thy candlestick out of his place, except thou repent. But this thou hast, that thou hatest the deeds of the Nicolaitanes, which I also hate. He that hath an ear, let him hear what the Spirit saith unto the churches; To him that overcometh will I give to eat of the tree of life, which is in the midst of the paradise of God" (Revelation 2:1-7).

Concerning the church of Ephesus, as well as all of the seven churches, the Lord addresses His messages "unto", or "to", the "angel" of that church. Some believe that the angels, which means "messengers", to which the messages of the churches are being delivered, are the pastors of those churches. This may be true. However, they may be actual angels from heaven. Notice that when Revelation was being given to John, it came by an angel: "The Revelation of Jesus Christ, which God gave unto him, to shew unto his servants things which must shortly come to pass; and he sent and signified it by his angel unto his servant John" (Revelation 1:1). It is an amazing thought that per-

haps the Lord has a special angel watching over each of His churches.

Jesus refers to Himself as "...he that holdeth the seven stars in his right hand, who walketh in the midst of the seven golden candlesticks" (Revelation 2:1). In chapter 1, verse 20, the seven candlesticks are the seven churches, and the seven stars are the angels of the churches (see chapter 9, verse 1, where a star also appears to represent an angel).

The Lord praises the good works of the saints in Ephesus, even to the trying of those who were false apostles. This not only shows the diligence of the Ephesian brethren, but it proves that the apostolic form of church government was being followed as instituted by Jesus. However, something tragic had happened to these disciples—they had left their "first love". Perhaps they were weary in well doing. Maybe the cares of this life was beginning to wear them down. In any case, they were just going through the motions and not having any real zeal for the work of the Lord. This is a good reminder for us. If we let our relationship with the Lord slip, we can also lose our first love for Him.

Jesus commands them to "repent, and do the first works". In other words, they were to regain their former loving relationship with Him, and to have a passion for His service. If they didn't, He would remove their candlestick out of its place. Their candlestick, we recall, was their church itself. How does a church get removed from its place? For one thing, it can stop being "the light of the world" (see Matthew 5:14-16). The local church can lose its influence in the community, and thus it can eventually die out.

However, the Ephesian brethren did hate "the deeds of the Nicolaitans", something that Jesus also hated. The Nicolaitans were a group of gnostic christians who were involved in immorality. The origin of this group is not known, but it was most likely started by a man named Nicolas and its licentiousness was practiced by some. The church of Ephesus did not allow these evil deeds to take place in their congregation. This was praised by the Lord

Jesus.

To each of the seven churches, the Lord gives this warning--a warning which applies to all disciples of every age: "He that hath an ear, let him hear what the Spirit saith unto the churches..." To the overcomer a promise is made that he or she will be given "to eat of the tree of life, which is in the midst of the paradise of God." This may be the final fulfillment of what was given to Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden (see Genesis 2:9).

"And unto the angel of the church in Smyrna write; These things saith the first and the last, which was dead, and is alive; I know thy works, and tribulation, and poverty, (but thou art rich) and I know the blasphemy of them which say they are Jews, and are not, but are the synagogue of Satan. Fear none of those things which thou shalt suffer: behold, the devil shall cast some of you into prison, that ye may be tried; and ye shall have tribulation ten days: be thou faithful unto death, and I will give thee a crown of life. He that hath an ear, let him hear what the Spirit saith unto the churches; He that overcometh shall not be hurt of the second death" (Revelation 2:8-11).

Here Jesus calls Himself "the first and the last" (see also chapter 1:11-18). He is the One who died for us and now is alive in heaven. The church in Smyrna is praised for its good works and for enduring tribulation. In financial matters, it is a poor church, but in spiritual matters it is a rich one. This is a wonderful testimony to this church, and it is a comforting message to us as well. We may be struggling with a low church budget. We may have a congregation which is not able to contribute very much in offerings. But the Lord looks at our hearts, not our offering plates. If our church is rich in faith, prayer, Bible study, and other spiritual matters, then we have a rich church.

Some in the church in Smyrna were apparently calling themselves Jews when they were not. To the Lord, this is not only telling a lie, but it is being "the synagogue of Satan". Many today want to call themselves Jews to try to receive of the blessings that are promised to Israel. Galatians 3:28 informs us that in Christ, "There is neither Jew nor Greek..." The Bible instructs us that there are three classes of people: Jews, Gentiles, and the church of God (see I Corinthians 10:32). Therefore, anyone who is truly in Christ is a member of the church of God. Furthermore, Galatians 3:29 teaches us: "And if ye be Christ's, then are ye Abraham's seed, and heirs according to the promise."

The devil would cast some of the Smyrna brethren into prison. This would be to try their faith. Every believer must have his or her faith tried. Perhaps some in our generation will be cast into prison for their faith. The Lord gives these promises: "...be thou faithful unto death, and I will give thee a crown of life." And, "...He that overcometh shall not be hurt of the second death" (Revelation 2:10-11).

"And to the angel of the church in Pergamos write; These things saith he which hath the sharp sword with two edges; I know thy works, and where thou dwellest, even where Satan's seat is: and thou holdest fast my name, and hast not denied my faith, even in those days wherein Antipas was my faithful martyr, who was slain among you, where Satan dwelleth. But I have a few things against thee, because thou hast there them that hold the doctrine of Balaam, who taught Balac to cast a stumblingblock before the children of Israel, to eat things sacrificed unto idols, and to commit fornication. So hast thou also them that hold the doctrine of the Nicolaitans, which thing I hate. Repent; or else I will come unto thee quickly, and will fight against them with the sword of my mouth. He that hath an ear, let him hear what the Spirit saith unto the churches; To him that overcometh will I give to eat of the hidden manna, and will give him a white stone, and in the stone a new name written, which no man knoweth saving he that receiveth it."

To the church in Pergamos Jesus is witnessed as having a sharp, double-edged sword. This probably represents the Word of God (see Hebrews 4:12). To this church, like the two preceding churches, the Lord praises them for their good works. They held fast to His name and had not denied Christ's faith, even though they lived among pagans who practiced gross idolatry. Antipas had been a faithful representative of Jesus, even giving up his life for his testimony to the Lord.

In Pergamos, there were temples dedicated to the pagan gods Zeus, Athene, Apollo, and Aesculapius. The symbol for Aesculapius was a serpent, and thus the worship of this pagan deity, as well as the others, may have given to Pergamos the notorious scriptural designation of "where Satan's seat is" (see Smith's Bible Dictionary, pg. 500).

However, some of the congregation in Pergamos held the "doctrine of Balaam". Balaam, we recall, was a backslidden prophet of God who had been "hired" by king Balak of Moab to curse the children of Israel. But God would not allow him to curse them. Later, Balaam gave counsel in order for the children of Israel to commit whoredom with the women of Moab and to eat sacrifices to, as well as worship, Moab's gods (see Numbers 22:1-12; 25:1-3; 31:15-16). Thus, like Balaam's influence, some in the Pergamos church were being enticed to eat "things sacrificed unto idols, and to commit fornication."

It may be possible to look at this situation in Pergamos through two different views: naturally and symbolically. Some of these church members may have been involved in these sins physically. Though the Apostle Paul makes it clear that believers may eat foods offered to idols, he also writes that it is a sin for one to do so with a defiled conscience (see I Corinthians 8:4-7). And, of course, it is always wrong for a person to commit fornication.

If the Scriptures are referring to committing these sins in a symbolical sense, then what may the Apostle John be teaching us? Since this situation is also present within the next church, Thyatira, we will wait until then to answer the question. But the "doctrine of the Nicolaitans" was also being taught in the church of Pergamos. This, as we have seen, was at least partly about physical fornication.

The message of the Lord for these believers is to repent or suffer the consequences. Overcomers will be able "to eat of the hidden manna" (possibly the Lord, Himself-see John 6:47-51), and will receive a white stone with a new name written in it.

"And unto the angel of the church in Thyatira write; These things saith the Son of God, who hath his eyes like unto a flame of fire, and his feet are like fine brass; I know thy works, and charity, and service, and faith, and thy patience, and thy works; and the last to be more than the first. Notwithstanding I have a few things against thee, because thou sufferest that woman Jezebel, which calleth herself a prophetess, to teach and to seduce my servants to commit fornication, and to eat things sacrificed unto idols. And I gave her space to repent of her fornication; and she repented not. Behold, I will cast her into a bed, and them that commit adultery with her into great tribulation, except they repent of their deeds. And I will kill her children with death; and all the churches shall know that I am he which searcheth the reigns and hearts: and I will give unto every one of you according to your works. But unto you I say, and unto the rest in Thyatira, as many as have not this doctrine, and which have not known the depths of Satan, as they speak; I will put upon you none other burden. But that which ye have already hold fast till I come. And he that overcometh, and keepeth my works unto the end, to him will I give power over the nations: And he shall rule them with a rod of iron; as the vessels of a potter shall they be broken to shivers: even as I received of my Father. And I will give him the morning star. He that hath an ear, let him hear what the Spirit saith unto the churches" (Revelation 2:18-29).

Jesus' appearance in this passage is similar to that in Revelation 1:14-15. Having "...eyes like unto a flame of fire, and his feet...like fine brass" probably refers to Christ's attribute of judgment, since fire and brass can designate this quality (see Exodus 27:1-3; Isaiah 66:15-17). The church in Thyatira was praised for a number of fine characteristics: works, charity, service, faith, patience, and that their last works were even more than their first. And yet, like most of the other churches, the Lord pointed out some things that He wanted to correct in the Thyatira church. He specifically mentions that they allowed "Jezebel", a self-proclaimed prophetess, "to teach and to seduce my servants to commit fornication, and to eat things sacrificed unto idols." This situation was similar, as we have seen, to that in the church in Pergamos.

Again, these sins may have been physically committed in the church in Thyatira. However, there may be some indication that they symbolize other abominations being perpetrated as well. For instance, in verse 23 the Lord informs us about this Jezebel: "...I will kill her children with death..." This could not be referring to Jezebel's natural children (unless they were also involved in their mother's sins), because the Lord promised that the children will not die for a parent's wrong doing (see Ezekiel 18:20). Very possibly, then, Jezebel's children represent her followers who are partaking of her teachings.

If committing fornication and eating things sacrificed to idols is symbolical, what could they represent? In the Old Testament, spiritual fornication against the Lord involved worshiping idols (see Ezekiel 16:20-25). Idolatry, therefore, is serving other gods rather than the Lord. It is putting one's thoughts and ways up higher than the Lord's thoughts and ways (see Isaiah 55:7-9). Eating things sacrificed to idols could involve receiving teachings which are contrary to the will of God. Jesus said "...My meat is to do the will of him that sent me, and to finish his work" (John 4:34). Romans 12:1 informs us to "...present your

bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service." Both of these concepts require obedience and submission to God's will.

Gnostic teachings were being introduced into the church of God, one of which was the substitution of Sunday worship for the Sabbath. Traditions of men were competing for acceptance along with the truth of God's Word. Paganism was, in some cases, being mixed in with the pure teachings of the apostles. Jezebel, therefore, may have represented a gnostic religious movement which was trying to "teach and to seduce" God's servants. These teachings may very well have involved physical fornication, too. In any case, they helped cause some in the Thyatira church to to disobey God's commandments and to follow an evil path.

One tragedy of these happenings was that "Jezebel" did not repent, even though the Lord gave her a chance to do so. Both she and her followers would have "great tribulation" unless they would repent, even to her children (possibly her followers) being killed by the Lord. Those who did not get involved with Jezebel's doctrine and "the depths of Satan" would be rewarded. They were to "hold fast till I come."

To the overcomer, Christ will "give power over the nations". He, or she, will "rule them with a rod of iron..." even as Jesus received of His Father. That person will also receive "the morning star."

Sister Monica Herrera was born May 4th, 1936, and went to rest May 29th, 2011. She was born in, and was a long time resident of, Seagoville, TX.



Unbelievable! It is difficult to believe that anyone could threaten to kill others in order to get them to convert to Islam or any other religion. This is an extreme form of

persecution. I am far from being an authority on Islam, but I do know that Islam was spread by the sword in the beginning of its being founded.

Of course times have changed, and many Muslims claim to be peaceful, which may be correct. There has been a division made between radical Muslims (sometimes call fundamental Muslims which are spoken of in the item) and peaceful Muslims who do not persecute Christians and others.

There seems to be a difference in the minds of Muhammad (the prophet of Islam) and our Lord Jesus Christ (Who is the living prophet that true Christians follow) in regard to the means in which their messages were to be spread. A religion can be no better than its founding prophet.

First, Islam seems to have been spread by the sword. However, in some manner, there appeared those who are peaceful. In Christianity, the opposite seems to be true. Christ told His disciples to preach the gospel. His disciples are to love one another, and they are to love their enemies-not kill them.

Jesus said, "Ye have heard that it hath been said, Thou shalt love thy neighbour, and hate thine enemy. But I say unto you, Love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which despitefully use you, and persecute you" (Matthew 5:43-44).

CHANGING HOLIDAY'S FOCUS

Church pushes to shed some of season's trappings

Lexington, Ky. - A Kentucky church is approaching Christmas a little differently this year: it is skipping it. And through advertisements around town and their Web site, www.skipchristmas.net, members of the church are urging you to do the same.

Crossroads Christian Church in Lexington isn't suggesting bailing out on the celebration altogether, just the bad parts: the stress, spending money you can't afford to spend, the huge crowds.

"We want to encourage people not to get so caught up in the trappings of the season that they miss the heart of what Christmas is about," said Fred Turner, a minister at the church. "We are not calling for people not to buy presents or put up trees, but we are trying to turn the focus on the things that matter."

He said people often tell him how they wish they could scale back and not spend as much on Christmas, or how they feel obligated to buy gifts for certain people, even if they don't want to.

He said the church got the idea from John Grisham's

book *Skipping Christmas* which has been made into a movie, *Christmas With the Kranks*. The story is about Luther Krank (Tim Allen), who is sick of the high costs of Christmas and persuades his wife to skip the holiday and spend the money on a cruise. When his Peace Corpsbound daughter decides to come home for Christmas, he goes into a frenzy of preparations.

The nondenominational church began weekly discussions earlier this month. The sessions focus on helping the community find simplicity, joy, rest, belonging, and Jesus, while skipping the loneliness, obligations and rush that come with the holiday.

"We really think this is important because the heart of Christmas needs to be getting back to who Jesus is and why he cares," Turner said.

Davis Caldwell, a member of the church since 1989, said he thinks some people might consider the church's message negative when they first see the advertisements – some just list the Web site address.

Caldwell said he thinks the ads will intrigue some, though, and encourage them to log on to find out what the message is all about.

"I think people will find it interesting when they see the Web site," he said.

Caldwell said that when the idea was brought up at church last month, he and other members were instantly excited.

He said the *Skipping Christmas* theme, as ironic as it might sound, will bring some back to the original reason for the holiday.

"It's fun to celebrate, it's fun to give gifts and talk about Santa and all of that, but it's important to focus on the gift God gave us: Jesus," he said.



Questions and Answers

Question: Will you please comment on family arguments in the home? How can we overcome them?

Answer: First, let us tell you a story. The new pastor was duly impressed when the hostess showed him around her house. "I spent seven years in hunting for the dishes to make up this matched set," she exclaimed. Then pointing to flowered drapes in the living room, she continued with a note of pride in her voice. "I spent two entire days scouring the department stores in New York City before I found these drapes to match our pink wallpaper."

A few weeks later, the pastor walked up to the same house for a brief visit. Pausing momentarily before ringing the doorbell, he overheard a violent quarrel raging among the family. The moment he touched the doorbell, the argument ceased, and he was ushered into the living room where he was greeted by a smiling wife and quiet children. Try as he might, however, his countenance betrayed his knowledge of the strife.

The wife, noticing his reaction, said, "I guess you overheard us."

"Unavoidable, I did," the pastor admitted sadly.

"That is the biggest blight to our happiness. Every now and then a quarrel breaks out to mar the tranquility of our home," the husband regretfully added.

From that point on, the pastor entered into a frank discussion of the difficulties with the family, who were all Believers. They listened attentively while he pointed out

God's commands on the matter of bitterness in the home, and told them that it was one of Satan's chief weapons in destroying contentment. The pastor ended his advice by pointing to the drapes in the living room. "If each one of you would choose your words as carefully as those drapes were chosen for the pleasantness of the home, I'm sure no unkind, hateful arguments would destroy its loveliness again." (end of story)

That God fearing home is typical of thousands of others. Months, and even years, are spent in careful selections of the pieces that go to make it a beautiful, harmonious place, but amid all the beauty little time is given to the selection of words of love and gentleness. It is even sadder because these same voices are often lifted in prayer around the table, or in family devotions. God's Word describes the situation perfectly: "Out of the same mouth proceedeth blessing and cursing. My brethren, these things ought not so to be" (James 3:10).

Theoretically, most Believers are aware of the Scriptures' teaching on this subject, but, sad to say, all too many fail to apply their knowledge to the refined art of abundant Christ-like living. It is rather sobering to realize that any person's intrinsic worth is no greater that his self-control in choosing his words to others.

Out of the ruin and wreck of humanity, the home still stands as our only foundation of society. This is particularly true of the religious home. Its very nature, built as it is on the love of a man and a woman, who by mutual consent committed themselves to one another, should cause every husband and wife to take account earnestly of their conversation in the home.

During the days of courtship, no harsh or contemptible words passed between them. The utmost kindness and patience were exercised, resulting in a period of continual pleasure. Any problems arising were quietly discussed, and a genuine effort was made to keep the harmony of the relationship on the highest level. Why, then, after the marriage ceremony, should this favorable condition cease to be? "Hateful words" supply the majority of the answers. Scripture instructs husbands and wives to love one another, and surely cranky words do not manifest this love.

How many homes, even religious homes, could testify that a few unkind words led from one thing to another, until bitter hate flared to unforeseen ramifications? How many times in unguarded fury a cutting word has caused deep sorrow to one near and dear, sometimes wounding to such an extent as to bring shipwreck to love and consequently to the marriage? God's Word tells us, "Pleasant words are as an honeycomb, sweet to the soul, and health to the bones" (Proverbs 16:24).

When husband and wife welcome into their home the gift of children, the responsibility is multiplied infinitely. The pattern of the child's entire future is molded and is set in the early impressionable years. No one can ever overestimate the importance of consecrated conduct in conversation during this time. When sensitive children are exposed to constant bickering, how can they hope to overcome the undesirable example set for them?

Why should children of God allow Satan to use the God-given gift of speech to breed bitterness and strife in the hearts of children? Passionate outbreaks of irritability often crush and even destroy a child's incentive in his daily activities. Then parents wonder why Junior is not getting along in school the way he should.

It has been said that no one ever won an argument, and we find in Job 6:25 Scriptural backing for this statement: "How forcible are right words! but what doth your arguing reprove?" The old adage "A man convinced against his will is of the same opinion still" is as true today as ever before.

We have noticed the negative side of this matter. Now let us glance at the other side.

"A soft answer turneth away wrath." Kind, tender words spoken in response to a quarrelsome person will

leave the pathway open to pleasantness. "A word fitly spoken is like apples of gold in pictures of silver" (Proverbs 25:11).

In this world of chaos and trouble, the home should be a mighty fortress of understanding and sympathy. Here the rough, sharp edge of the world's rebuffs must be soothed. The husband, home from the pressure of a difficult day in the business world, has a right to expect encouragement from his wife. The wife, tired with her day's work, has every right to expect words of love and affection from her husband when he returns home.

Here, behind closed doors of the home, advice and correction should be meted out, tempered with wholesome love. Problems may be solved without contention, both husband and wife remembering the Lord's promise of guidance.


The God-fearing home, according to God's Word, should be the schooling ground for children in the ministration of godly instruction. "And these words, which I command thee this day, shall be in thine heart: And thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children, and shalt talk of them when thou sittest in thine house, and when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down, and when thou riseth up" (Deuteronomy 6:6-7). These verses are a powerful indictment against the laxness exhibited by the average Christ-like parents toward their responsibility to their children in regard to instruction in the Ten Commandments.

Our peculiarities and weaknesses are best known to our loved ones, and by the same token, theirs are known by us. These circumstances require a great deal of tolerance in our attitude. We can help the members of our households overcome these handicaps, or we can aggravate these difficulties by not using tact and love.

David's prayer, found in Psalm 141:3, offers the Godgiven corrective for strife, bickering, quarrels, and every sort of trouble arising from the abuse of the tongue: "Set a watch, O LORD, before my mouth; keep the door of my lips."

Question: Who were the angels of the seven churches of the second and third chapters of Revelation?

Answer: The word "angel" means "messenger", and those "angels of the churches" were doubtless messengers from the churches sent to inform John in his exile on Patmos.

LESSON I

Scripture Reading: Numbers 13:17-33. Golden Text: Numbers 13:17 (first part).

"And Moses sent them to spy out the land of Canaan,..."

NOTE: The Lord has led the children of Israel in their long journey to Canaan, and now they were at the very border of the land.

- 1. At this time, what did God tell Moses to do? Numbers 13:1-2.
- 2. What did Moses ask these spies to do? Numbers 13:17-18.
- 3. Besides finding out about the strength of the people, what else were they to look for? Numbers 13:19-20.
- 4. How long were the spies gone? Numbers 13:25.
- 5. When the spies returned, what did they bring with them? Numbers 13:26-27.
- 6. What report did they give of the people there? Numbers 13:28.
- 7. Caleb was one of the spies and what did he say? Did the other spies agree with him? Numbers 13:30-32.

NOTE: Joshua and Caleb were the only two spies who brought back a good report.

8. What did the spies who brought evil reports call the people who were in Canaan? Numbers 13:33.

NOTE: Out of the 12 spies who went into Canaan, 10 returned with an evil report. Two believed God and wanted to cross over the land. They knew He had been with them all the way and would still protect them.

LESSON II

MURMURINGS OF THE PEOPLE

Scripture Reading: Numbers 14:1-9. Golden Text: Numbers 14:2 (first part).

"And all the children of Israel murmured against Moses and against Aaron..."

NOTE: In our last lesson, we found that 12 spies were sent out into the land of Canaan. When they returned, only 2 gave a good report and wanted to go over and take the land.

- 1. What effect did the evil report of the 10 spies have on the people? Numbers 14:1.
- 2. Were they sorry they had left Egypt, and what did they decide to do? Numbers 14:2-4.
- 3. What did Moses and Aaron do? Numbers 14:5.
- 4. Joshua and Caleb were the two spies who brought a good report. What did they say to the people? Numbers 14:7-8.
- 5. Why did they tell the people not to be afraid? Numbers 14:9.
- 6. What did the congregation want to do with their leaders? Numbers 14:10.


