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Halloween

How is it that we have a day set aside every year in our country where the focus is on ghosts, goblins, witches, devils, death and violence all packaged in a kid-friendly, family oriented manner? A visit to the History Channel website can provide a pretty comprehensive overview of how Halloween came to America in a few short videos and articles they have posted there. What follows is my summary of how Halloween came to be in the US based on their information provided.

Step 1: Start with an ancient Celtic festival called Samhain (pronounced "sow-in") that marked the end of summer and harvest and the beginning of the dark, cold winter, a time of year they associated with human death and the belief that the boundary between the worlds of the living and dead became blurred. On the night of October 31st, they celebrated Samhain when it was believed the ghosts of the dead returned to the earth. To celebrate this event they would gather together to burn crops and animals as sacrifices to the Celtic deities and would wear costumes to "confuse" the spirits roaming the earth into thinking they too were a spirit and leave them alone. Many other practices that are associated with this holiday can

be found with their roots in Samhain.

Step 2: Under the power and authority of the Roman empire, combine Samhain with Roman holidays celebrating the dead and the goddess Pomona.

Step 3: Re-brand these celebrations as "Christian". To convert or combine the Celtic and Roman practices of the different observances/celebrations of the dead with the so-called "Christian" holidays of All Martyrs and All Souls Day, under Popes Boniface IV and Gregory III, the holidays were moved to November 1st and 2nd and October 31st became "All-Hallows Eve", later becoming Halloween.

Step 4: Although the early settlers to America did not believe that Halloween was appropriate and did not widely recognize or observe the holiday, over time, the practices of Halloween came to America. The main thrust came from the millions of Irish immigrants fleeing to America during the potato famine in the mid-1800's, bringing with them their well ingrained Celtic Samhain celebrations.

Step 5: Further re-brand the holiday as a family time and a time to focus on children and add-in new customs and traditions that are uniquely American. The idea of community, family, children and a time of celebration were heavily infused and the "evil" side of the holiday downplayed and de-emphasized.

Step 6: Commercialize it. Retailers began to latch onto the holiday to take advantage of the business opportunity and began to promote the celebration of it to make profit. The History Channel indicates the annual holiday is responsible for \$6 billion in revenue making it the second largest commercial holiday in the country. The relentless advertising, commercials and in-store displays

has continued to grow year after year.

There you have it. From my perspective, this is how Halloween became a powerful institution in America.

“Behold, The Bridegroom Cometh; Go Ye Out To Meet Him”

“And at midnight there was a cry made, Behold, the bridegroom cometh; go ye out to meet him” (Matthew 25:6).

You will notice here in the tenth verse of this same chapter; “...and they that were ready went in with him to the marriage: and the door was shut.” These five “wise” virgins were ready with the oil (Holy Spirit) in their lamps. It is this quickening Spirit that makes the change, “...In a moment, in the twinkling of an eye...” (I Corinthians 15:51-52).

“But if the Spirit of him that raised up Jesus from the dead dwell in you, he that raised up Christ from the dead shall also quicken your mortal bodies by his Spirit that dwelleth in you” (Romans 8:11).

“For as many as are led by the Spirit of God, they are the sons of God” (verse 14).

We have shown that it is the Holy Spirit (oil in our lamps) dwelling in us that changes or quickens our mortal bodies so that we are ready to meet Jesus in the air and go with Him to the marriage supper. We cannot be called the sons of God without the Holy Spirit.

Jesus said in John 14:2-3: “In my Father’s house are many mansions: if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again, and receive you unto myself; that where I am, there ye may be also.”

Yes, dear Christian friend, we are going to be wherever Jesus is when the cry goes forth, “go ye out to meet him.”

“For the Lord himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God: and the dead in Christ shall rise first: Then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together

with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air: and so shall we ever be with the Lord” (I Thessalonians 4:16-17).

true are thy ways, thou King of saints.”

This meeting of the saints with their King is not when His feet shall stand upon the mount of Olives. The marriage supper is over, and the saints go with Him to the mount of Olives when He wears many crowns and is King of kings and Lord of lords. The saints then shall receive their reward

as kings and priests and shall reign with Him for one thousand years.

“Wherefore the rather, brethren, give diligence to make your calling and election sure...” (II Peter 1:10); “and they that were ready went in with him to the marriage: and the door was shut” (Matthew 25:10).

THOUGHTS ABOUT DISCOURAGEMENT

Discouragement is only one method used by Satan to oppose God’s people, and the Apostle Paul speaks of his own infirmities. He wrote, “And lest I should be exalted above measure through the abundance of the revelations, there was given to me a thorn in the flesh, the messenger of Satan to buffet me, lest I should be exalted above measure. For this thing I besought the Lord thrice, that it might depart from me. And he said unto me, My grace is sufficient for thee: for my strength is made perfect in weakness. Most gladly therefore will I rather glory in my infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me. Therefore I take pleasure in infirmities, in reproaches, in necessities, in persecutions, in distresses for Christ’s sake: for when I am weak, then am I strong” (II Corinthians 12:7-10).

There are many differences of opinions as to just what Paul’s infirmity might have been. However, the important thing was the apostle’s recognition of the manner in which Satan was making use of it to discourage him. The Apostle Peter says that we should resist Satan by being steadfast in the faith. What lesson can we learn from this? It is very obvious. The words “Sanctify yourselves” were a command that passed from tent to tent in Israel on the day before a great event was to take place. This memorable day came after forty years of wandering in the wilderness where so many of the children of Israel were lost because of lack of faith in God. They would grumble against God or disobey that only two men who left Egypt over the age of twenty were permitted to take part in this sanctification and to behold the wonders God was to show them.

This command was given so they might prepare for a mighty display of God’s power on the morrow. This sanctification was carried out, and God did show wonders to them. If they had not heeded the command, God would not have performed this miracle.

The priests bearing the ark proceeded to the Jordan River followed by a sanctified people. These people were camped by the banks of Jordan which at this time of year overflowed its banks. They had no boats, and it was an impossibility to cross unless something supernatural was done. They confidently moved to the banks of the Jordan. The priests marched into the water, and it was then that God’s wonder-working power began. Praise God, no man can hinder such power, and this power was shown by faith. When they had faith to step in, the water began to roll back, and a sanctified people walked over dry shod. Twelve men were selected to gather stones from the bed of the river to build a memorial of this great event on the banks of this river. Years have passed and men are still being told of this glorious and triumphant entry into the promised land. This day did not come until a day of sanctification was proclaimed in which the people sanctified themselves.

Many times in reading the history of Israel, we find God had them to sanctify themselves before He would

deliver them from the powers of evil men. I would like to state that God's power is unchanged and is still mighty to work wonders among His people. His power is limited, however, according to the extent of sanctification among His people. If His people expect to behold His wonders, they must sanctify themselves by not being afraid to humble themselves and ask God to forgive them of every mistake and draw near to Him with all their heart.

We have a statement in Matthew 13:58 as follows: "And he did not many mighty works there because of their unbelief." Jesus was reared to manhood at Nazareth, and, it seemed, there should have been the place for many mighty works, yet it was limited by reason of the hardness of their hearts. Mark says: "And he could there do no mighty work, save that he laid his hands upon a few sick folk, and healed them" (Mark 6:5).

His power was limited because of unbelief. The very possibility of aid was cut off because of the absence of those fixed principles on which His wonder working power depends. There had been no day of sanctification, and they saw no tomorrow of wonders.

God today has not changed, but men and women have changed. They are not willing to humble themselves before the mighty hand of God and sanctify themselves so they might behold the wonders of God.

God's power is marked by obedience to His laws. These marks are seen among the remnant group who have a deep hungering for a closer walk with God. It is when men and women are not willing to humble themselves but manifest a self-righteous attitude, honoring Him with their lips, yet their hearts are far from Him, that God cannot do any mighty work. It is no wonder God withholds the manifestation of His presence and power from people who continue to live worldly and have no fruit of the Holy Spirit in their lives. That window from which God pours out His blessings is barred from the manward side but not from the Godward side. When we sanctify ourselves, we have no doubts, so our sanctification must precede God's tomorrow.

The world as well as the churches have fallen into a deep sleep, and the spirit of lethargy is gripping the people

who profess God, blinding their ministers that they cannot see. Our natural or human eyes and ears cannot see or hear the things God has for us, but God can and will reveal them to us by His Holy Spirit which must dwell in us if we are to be saved in that great day. That is the office of the Comforter or Holy Spirit to lead us into all the truth. If we do not have the Holy Spirit in us, it is an impossibility for us to understand or grasp the deep things of God.

John had a wonderful vision on the Isle of Patmos, looking on down beyond 1954. He saw the holy City coming down with sheets of pure gold as transparent glass and gates of pearl. It is the Spirit-filled man and woman who are caught up to the marriage supper of the Lamb in this great city. See Revelation 15:1-2; 19:7-9. May the Holy Spirit come into our lives and open up our hearts and minds that we may grasp the truth, for it is the truth that makes us free.

Remember that the ten virgins all looked alike as far as having lamps and being virgins were concerned, but when the cry went forth, "...the bridegroom cometh; go ye out to meet him," it was then shown who had oil or the Holy Spirit. FLEEING IDOLATRY

The Book of Daniel contains practical lessons for the Christians of this present day. The most outstanding lesson is in relationship to idolatry. Perhaps one would suggest that the Christian needs no exhortation in regard to idolatry; but Paul in writing to the Corinthians says, "Flee from idolatry". And John in concluding his first Epistle writes, "Little children, keep yourselves from idols". If idolatry were not a real evil for the Christian to avoid, these exhortations would not have been given.

The three Hebrew children were confronted with the choice of bowing to Nebuchadnezzar's image or being thrown alive into the fiery furnace. But they were determined not to commit idolatry, even though their courageous stand cost them their lives. Today, the Christian is tempted on every side to bow to the world's idols. Although the test is largely a spiritual one, and the penalty does not affect our physical lives as it did the Hebrew children, yet the principle involved is the same. Anything we love more than God is idolatry. All about us are people bowing low to the gods of pleasure, money, self-gratification, power and praise. And if we are to avoid this evil idolatry, we must depend upon God as the three Hebrews did.

Can you not picture the occasion of which Daniel writes? The signal sounds out which means that everyone is to bow before the golden image. And while everyone bowed these three young men stood. No doubt the Babylonians around them laughed them to scorn. What foolish young men! They need only bow once to spare their lives. But they would gladly sacrifice their lives than betray their God.

Perhaps as the signal sounded and Meshach remained standing, he wondered if he were the only one. He looked

around and saw that Abednego and Shadrach were also standing, and how he rejoiced at this companionship in suffering. Friendship is sweet as we share our joys with one another, but how much more precious it is when our friends stand with us in times of trial, and reproach, and suffering! Paul writes of fellowshiping with Christ in His sufferings, as he identifies himself with the reproach of the Cross. A true Christian not only enters into the joyful aspect of fellowship with Christ and His followers but is quite willing to go with Christ and His disciples into the furnace of affliction, also.

Today the two's and three's who meet together in His Name, and who refuse to bow to the world's institutions, feel the scorn of the world upon them. "In the world ye shall have tribulation"; "If the world hate you, ye know that it hated me before it hated you"; "All that will live godly in Christ Jesus shall suffer persecution" are the words of Scripture, and the faithful few that meet in Christ's Name realize these facts fully. But as they fellowship, they look at each other and are mutually strengthened, encouraged, and cheered. That is one reason that the child of God should not forsake the assembling himself with other Christians.

What happened to these young Hebrew stalwarts? They were bound hand and foot and cast alive into the burning, fiery furnace. But what was an apparent defeat for them and the God that they served, was used of God to glorify His holy Name. In the fiery furnace, they not only enjoyed the fellowship of one another, but above all they had companionship of the Son of God. Every child of God who takes his stand for Christ, and refuses to bow to the world's idols, may be assured of the presence of Christ in the midst of the world's reproach.

These young men were fortified by God's Word. They knew that it commanded them to worship the Lord their God and to bow to no image, and thus enlightened they adhered completely to "Thus saith the Lord". The same Sword of the Spirit which Jesus used to defeat the devil in the temptation in the wilderness was used by these three young men triumphantly.

Such a victory always resounds to the praise of God. In this case, it resulted in a world-wide proclamation made by Nebuchadnezzar himself. He exclaimed, "...Blessed be the God of Shadrach, Meshach, and Abed-nego, who hath sent his angel, and delivered his servants that trusted

in him,...and yielded their bodies, that they might not serve nor worship any god, except their own God." Then he made a decree which closed with these words, "...because there is no other God that can deliver after this sort" (Daniel 3:28, 29).

Let us flee from idolatry at any cost. We may not be faced with such alternative as the three Hebrew children were, but even if we were we may have this assurance: their God still lives today, and He is the same yesterday, and today, and tomorrow; and with each test He gives all the grace and strength that is necessary. Through our steadfastness, great glory will be given to His Name.

Why Me?

When bad things, or troubles, come upon people, many will throw up their hands and ask: "Why me?" Many people think that what they are going through is unfair or unjust, not realizing that far greater calamities are really their just desert. Let us, as believers, never get into the mold of asking "Why me?" when things don't go our way.

Jesus never asked "Why me?" when He went through hurtful experiences, though He of all people did go through truly unjust situations. Jesus always looked for the Father's will in every experience that He went through. He did so by at least two methods. The first method that we will examine was that of prayer.

In Mark 1:35 we read: "And in the morning, rising up a great while before day, he went out, and departed into a solitary place, and there prayed." It was Jesus' custom to pray for everything. We see in this passage in Mark that Jesus was even willing to make a sacrifice to pray. He arose a great while before day to be in contact with His heavenly Father. If the truth be told, many of us would rather be in bed, sleeping, than to get up a great while before day to spend time in prayer. But prayer was one of the methods that Jesus relied upon to help answer the many situations in which He was involved.

The second method that we will look at that Jesus

used was the study of the Scriptures. It was His habit to say "It is written" when referring to the Scriptures. Jesus even spoke to the devil this way. We gain much information about our situations in life by studying the Scriptures. Many folks only study their Bibles when they are in Church. This is a tragedy, because as we eat food every day, so we need the spiritual nourishment every day that only the Scriptures can give us.

Instead of asking, "Why me?" when we go through an unpleasant experience, maybe we should ask, "What is the purpose for which I'm going through this experience?" Perhaps it is just common, every day situations that are coming upon us. Perhaps we have committed a particular sin, that we can think of, and the Lord may be chastising us. Hebrews 12:5-13 reads: "And ye have forgotten the exhortation which speaketh unto you as unto children, My son, despise not thou the chastening of the Lord, nor faint when thou art rebuked of him: For whom the Lord loveth he chasteneth, and scourgeth every son whom he receiveth. If ye endure chastening, God dealeth with you as with sons; for what son is he whom the father chasteneth not? But if ye be without chastisement, whereof all are partakers, then are ye (illegitimate), and not sons. Fur-

thermore we have had fathers of our flesh which corrected us, and we gave them reverence: shall we not much rather be in subjection unto the Father of spirits, and live? For they verily for a few days chastened us after their own pleasure; but he for our profit, that we might be partakers of his holiness. Now no chastening for the present seemeth to be joyous, but grievous: nevertheless afterward it yieldeth the peaceable fruit of righteousness unto them which are exercised thereby. Wherefore lift up the hands which hang down, and the feeble knees; And make straight paths for your feet, lest that which is lame be turned out of the way; but let it rather be healed."

If you can think of no particular sin that you have committed, then perhaps it is a test of the Lord to see if you will continue to be faithful to Him under trying circumstances. Remember that Job and other saints went through difficult situations and they proved to be faithful through them. In any circumstance, look for a lesson that you can learn through the trying times.

The Scriptures also advise us to give thanks for every situation that we go through. First Thessalonians 5:17-18 reads: "Pray without ceasing. In every thing give thanks: for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you." This really does work to help us through the rough times.

I was feeling bad the other day about circumstances that I thought were unfair in my life. But then I started giving God thanks for even the negative things that were in my life, and then the "unfairness" of the situations faded away from me.

When Jesus was hanging on the cross He did ask His Father: "...Eli, Eli, lama sabachthani? that is to say, My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" (Matthew 27:46). But this was not said in pity for Himself, but was a question that Jesus asked His Father in fulfillment of biblical prophecy (see Psalm 22:1).

Instead of asking, "Why me?" maybe we should ask, "Why not me?" If we are true followers of Jesus, then we are going to suffer with Christ. First Peter 2:21-25 admonishes us: "For even hereunto were ye called: because Christ also suffered for us, leaving us an example, that ye should follow his steps: Who did no sin, neither was guile found in his mouth: Who, when he was reviled, reviled not again; when he suffered, he threatened not; but committed himself to him that judgeth righteously: Who his own self bare our sins in his own body on the tree, that we, being dead to sins, should live unto righteousness: by whose stripes ye were healed. For ye were as sheep going astray; but are now returned unto the Shepherd and Bishop of your souls."

Greeting People

In Paul's letters to the churches he makes a point to greet the brethren in a rather encompassing style. For instance, in his letter to the Romans the Apostle Paul, in his benediction, greets a number of the brothers and sisters. "I commend unto you Phebe our sister, which is a servant of the church which is at Cenchrea: That ye receive her in the Lord, as becometh saints, and that ye assist her in whatsoever business she hath need of you: for she hath been a succourer of many, and of myself also. Greet Priscilla and Aquila my helpers in Christ Jesus: Who have for my life laid down their own necks: unto whom not only I give thanks, but also all the churches of

the Gentiles. Likewise greet the church that is in their house. Salute my wellbeloved Epaphroditus, who is the firstfruits of Achaia unto Christ. Greet Mary, who bestowed much labour on us. Salute Andronicus and Junia, my kinsmen, and my fellowprisoners, who are of note among the apostles, who also were in Christ before me. Greet Amplias my beloved in the Lord. Salute Urbane, our helper in Christ, and Stachys my beloved. Salute Apelles approved in Christ. Salute them which are of Aristobulus' household. Salute Herodion my kinsman. Greet them that be of the household of Narcissus, which are in the Lord. Salute Tryphena and Tryphosa, who labour in the Lord. Salute

the beloved Persis, which laboured much in the Lord. Salute Rufus chosen in the Lord, and his mother and mine. Salute Asyncritus, Phlegon, Hermas, Patrobas, Hermes, and the brethren which are with them. Salute Philologus, and Julia, Nereus, and his sister, and Olympas, and all the saints which are with them. Salute one another with an holy kiss. The churches of Christ salute you" (Romans 16:1-16).

Greeting, or saluting, others, not of your brethren only, was a message that Christ taught. "And if ye salute your brethren only, what do ye more than others? do not even the publicans so? Be ye therefore perfect, even as your Father which is in heaven is perfect" (Matthew 5:47-48).

This may have been one of the main reasons that the early Church of God grew so rapidly and in such numbers. I mention this point because, to my recollection, I have attended a church, or churches, where hardly anyone recognized that I was even in attendance. And then, apparently, I have attended a church, or churches, where there was an appointed "welcoming committee" that made sure I was greeted and welcomed to that church. What a difference it makes. In one church you may feel that nobody cares a bit if you attend or not. And in another church

you may feel like a king or queen in attendance.

The reason, I believe, that Paul made such an effort to greet the brethren was because he genuinely cared for them. He was interested in how they were doing, and how the church was doing where they were in attendance. Such a caring attitude made the brothers and sisters closer to each other and, possibly, to the Lord. When Paul was leaving the Church in Ephesus there was a tremendous outpouring of emotion for him. They felt really close to him. In Acts 20:36-38, after Paul had addressed the brethren, we learn: "And when he had thus spoken, he kneeled down, and prayed with them all. And they all wept sore, and fell on Paul's neck, and kissed him, Sorrowing most of all for the words which he spake, that they should see his face no more. And they accompanied him unto the ship."

Of course, if a church member really doesn't care if another is in attendance or not then he or she should question his or her relationship to the Lord. This is the one identifying characteristic of a disciple of Jesus. The Lord taught in John 13:34-35: "A new commandment I give unto you, That ye love one another; as I have loved you, that ye also love one another. By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another."

John: The Beloved Disciple

The Apostle John is known as the disciple whom Jesus loved (see John 13:23). Now we know that Jesus loved all of His disciples, but there appears to be a special bond between John and Jesus. Let us take a few minutes to see why this was possibly the case.

Going back to John 13:23 we can see a possible reason for this closeness. "Now there was leaning on Jesus' bosom one of his disciples, whom Jesus loved." This event was at the time of Jesus' last passover with His disciples. Of all twelve of the Lord's disciples with Him at this passover, we find only John "leaning on Jesus' bosom". This shows a special connection that John had for his Master. In Proverbs 8:17, in a verse speaking about Wis-

dom personified (Jesus), we read: "I love them that love me; and those that seek me early shall find me." Those who have a special love for the Lord will, in turn, be loved by the Lord. We see this relationship in the early days of Solomon. In II Samuel 12:24 we learn: "And David comforted Bathsheba his wife, and went in unto her, and lay with her: and she bare a son, and he called his name Solomon: and the LORD loved him." We can also see the great love that Solomon had for the Lord in I Kings 3:3-14. "And Solomon loved the LORD, walking in the statutes of David his father: only he sacrificed and burnt incense in high places. And the king went to Gibeon to sacrifice there; for that was the great high place: a thou-

sand burnt offerings did Solomon offer upon that altar. In Gibeon the LORD appeared to Solomon in a dream by night: and God said, Ask what I shall give thee. And Solomon said, Thou hast showed unto thy servant David my father great mercy, according as he walked before thee in truth, and in righteousness, and in uprightness of heart with thee; and thou hast kept for him this great kindness, that thou hast given him a son to sit on his throne, as it is this day. And now, O LORD my God, thou hast made thy servant king instead of David my father: and I am but a little child: I know not how to go out or come in. And thy servant is in the midst of thy people which thou hast chosen, a great people, that cannot be numbered nor counted for multitude. Give therefore thy servant an understanding heart to judge thy people, that I may discern between good and bad: for who is able to judge this thy so great a people? And the speech pleased the Lord, that Solomon had asked this thing. And God said unto him, Because thou hast asked this thing, and hast not asked for thyself long life; neither hast asked riches for thyself, nor hast asked the life of thine enemies; but hast asked for thyself understanding to discern judgment; Behold, I have done according to thy words: lo, I have given thee a wise and an understanding heart; so that there was none like thee before thee, neither after thee shall any arise like unto thee. And I have also given thee that which thou hast not asked, both riches, and honour: so that there shall not be any among the kings like unto thee all thy days. And if thou wilt walk in my ways, to keep my statutes and my commandments, as thy father David did walk, then I will lengthen thy days." The same can be true of us as well. If we love God by keeping His commandments and ways, He will have a special love for us too.

Going back to the Apostle John, we see him becoming one of Jesus' first disciples. In Matthew 4:21-22 we read: "And going on from thence, he saw other two brethren, James the son of Zebedee, and John his brother, in a ship with Zebedee their father, mending their nets; and he called them. And they immediately left the ship and their father, and followed him." John became one of Jesus' inner circle of disciples because of his devotion to the Master. In various situations we see him, with Peter and James, being in this inner circle. We see these three at the mount of transfiguration with Jesus (Matthew 17:1-9). We witness the three with Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane

(Matthew 26:37-38). We glimpse Peter, with John, visiting the empty tomb of Jesus (John 20:3-10). And we find Jesus speaking about John to Peter (John 21:20-24).

John seemed to have a special understanding of Jesus' ministry. He recorded the conversation that Jesus had with the woman from Samaria (see John 4). He wrote about Jesus as the water of life (John 4:13-15. See also 7:37-39). He wrote of Jesus being the bread of life (John 6:32-58). He recorded Jesus' teaching that He was the door of the sheepfold (John 10:1-9). John gave special attention to Jesus' message of love (John 14:23-24; 15:9-14; 16:26-27).

John is the disciple to whom Jesus entrusted His mother, Mary's, care after He was gone (see John 19:26-27). Yes, John was a disciple whom Jesus loved. Will He be as close to you and me? He can be!

ASTEROID APOCALYPSE

The following is an article which appeared in **USA Today**. Its title is *NASA prepares for asteroid apocalypse*:

Today's forecast: end of the world.

Well, not really, but if a big enough asteroid was on a collision course with Earth, we'd really have something more than scattered showers to worry about.

NASA (not to mention the rest of us) would like to avoid such a catastrophe. The agency is conducting a drill this week to see how we'd prepare if a giant rock was hurtling toward our home planet.

"Although large impacts are rare, it's important to be prepared," NASA said in a statement. "That's why NASA and other U.S. agencies and international partners gather periodically to simulate impact scenarios and discuss the best course of action."

The project will play out as a tabletop exercise through Friday at the 2019 Planetary Defense Conference in College Park, Maryland, Space.com said. NASA experts prepared a fictional scenario in which an asteroid apparently will crash into Earth in 2027.

Space.com said, "They'll talk through how to determine what regions face what risks and how to respond – all in the hopes that if they ever face a similar situation in real life, they'll be ready for it."

To avoid any unnecessary panic, the conference plainly states on its website that "Although this scenario is realistic in many ways, it is completely fictional and does NOT describe an actual potential asteroid impact."

Lindley Johnson, NASA's planetary defense officer, said in a statement that "these exercises have really helped us in the planetary defense community to understand what our colleagues on the disaster management side need to know. This exercise will help us develop more effective communications with each other."

The drill is part of the National Near-Earth Object Preparedness Strategy and Action Plan developed over two years and published by the White House in June 2018. NASA's Planetary Defense Coordination Office, which leads the drill, is the federal entity in charge of coordinating efforts to protect Earth from hazardous asteroids. It's responsible for finding, tracking and characterizing potentially hazardous objects and issuing warnings about possible impacts.

For more than 20 years, NASA and its international partners have scanned the skies for "near-Earth objects," or asteroids and comets that orbit the sun and come within 30 million miles of Earth's orbit. NASA has participated in six impact exercises – three at Planetary Defense Conferences (2013, 2015, 2017) and three jointly with the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

Deflecting an asteroid on a collision course with Earth would have to be done years before the predicted impact. The two most promising techniques NASA is investigating are the “kinetic impactor” (striking an asteroid with an object to slightly slow it down) and the “gravity tractor” (gravitationally tugging on an asteroid by placing a large mass near it).

Fortunately, no known asteroid poses a significant risk of impact over the next 100 years, NASA says.

A study in 2017 found the deadliest effects of an asteroid impact would be ferocious winds of up to 1,000 mph and intense shock waves.

Comment

Webster’s New World Dictionary defines apocalypse as meaning “a disclosure regarded as prophetic revelation”. True prophetic revelation is only found in God’s Word, the Bible. Biblical prophecy mentions nothing about an asteroid being on a collision course with the Earth. Therefore, this idea is an invention of man. However, it is good that many are aware that the world (age) will end although they cannot make or prepare for any one apocalypse.

ABOUT PORNOGRAPHY

It is reported that the Arizona legislature is now considering declaring pornography a public health crisis. A state representative introduced the resolution. She noted that 30 peer-reviewed studies show the detrimental effect of pornography on the brain. She said pornography is a social toxin that destroys families, damages children, harms women and breeds violence. The representative noted that a national study shows that 64 percent of young people ages 13 to 24 view pornography once a week or more and that 1 in 10 visitors to pornography websites are 10 years old or younger. The representative compared pornography with the tobacco industry. She said both have created a public health crisis. Thirteen states have passed similar resolutions.

Comment

We agree that pornography is a public health crisis.

ROBOTS IN LAS VEGAS

This year a company plans to install at Vegas resorts an unknown number of automated beverage machines which are programmed to mix hundreds of different drinks all at the touch of a button. The job depended on service workers for many years. At Nevada casinos, rank and file union workers do not know for certain whether machines will force them to abandon their jobs and force them to develop new skills.

FARMERS IN CRISIS

American farmers were already plagued by a biblical parade of misfortune which includes years of low prices and a trade war with China. They are now grappling with record Midwest rain. This will likely prevent a large portion of this year’s crops from even getting planted.

ABOUT VENEZUELA

At this time, U.S. military action is still possible in Venezuela to bolster opposition leader Juan Guaido’s bid to oust President Nicolas Maduro. However, Secretary of State Pompeo and other officials, including President Donald Trump, have said “all options are on the table” but focused mostly on economic sanctions and other diplomatic tools.

“We are trying to do everything we can to avoid violence. We’d prefer a peaceful transition of government there when Maduro leaves and a new election is held.”

Comment

Let us pray that economic sanctions and other diplomatic tools work. We do not need to go into another conflict where many of our troops may lose their lives.

MILITARY SEXUAL ASSAULTS

According to a report, sexual assaults in the military rose nearly 38 percent from 2016 to 2018. The spike in crime within the ranks comes after years of focused effort and resources to eradicate it.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Question: Many in the political world today seem to be liars. What does God's Word tell us about the person who lies?

Answer: First, let us begin with a **NOTE**. Then we will list a few consequences for the person who lies, bears false witness:

The ninth Commandment of God's Ten Commandments states, "Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbour" (Exodus 20:16). False words dig deep into the heart when this Commandment is broken. False words can do more harm than a physical blow. The person who breaks this Commandment becomes a willing partner with Satan (the devil) who is the "father of all lies" and "the accuser" of believers. Consider the following two verses: "Ye are of your father the devil, and the lusts of your father ye will do. He was a murderer from the beginning, and abode not in the truth, because there is no truth in him. When he speaketh a lie, he speaketh of his own: for he is a liar, and the father of it" (John 8:44).

"And I heard a loud voice saying in heaven, Now is come salvation, and strength, and the kingdom of our God, and the power of his Christ: for the accuser of our brethren is cast down, which accused them before our God day

and night" (Revelation 12:10).

The person who lies will not inherit the kingdom of God. "But the fearful and unbelieving, and the abominable, and murderers, and whoremongers, and sorcerers, and idolaters, AND ALL LIARS, shall have their part in the lake which burneth with fire and brimstone: which is the second death" (Revelation 21:8). "And there shall in no wise enter into it any thing that defileth, neither whatsoever worketh abomination, OR MAKETH A LIE: but they which are written in the Lamb's book of life" (Revelation 21:27).

The person who lies will not escape. He shall face the judgment of God and perish. "A false witness shall not be unpunished, AND HE THAT SPEAKETH LIES SHALL NOT ESCAPE" (Proverbs 19:5). "And I will come near to you to judgment; and I will be a swift witness against the sorcerers, and against the adulterers, AND AGAINST FALSE SWEARERS, and against those that oppress the hireling in his wages, the widow, and the fatherless, and that turn aside the stranger from his right, and fear not me, saith the LORD of hosts" (Malachi 3:5).

The person who lies only deceives himself. He has an empty religion. "If any man among you seem to be religious, and bridled not his tongue, but deceiveth his own heart, this man's religion is vain" (James 1:26).

The person who lies will have a life marked by a critical spirit that is quick to judge the actions of others. "Speak not evil one of another, brethren. He that speaketh evil of his brother, and judgeth his brother, speaketh evil of the law, and judgeth the law: but if thou judge the law, thou art not a doer of the law, but a judge" (James 4:11).

QUESTION: How should we respond to the Scriptures?

ANSWER: There are many ways in which we should respond to the Scriptures. The following are some of them.

We should awe (reverence) the Scriptures. "Princes have persecuted me without a cause: but my heart standeth in awe of thy word" (Psalm 119:161). We should treasure the Scriptures more than food. "Neither have I gone back

from the commandment of his lips; I have esteemed the words of his mouth more than my necessary food” (Job 23:12).

We should love the Scriptures. “Thy word is very pure: therefore thy servant loveth it” (Psalm 119:140).

We should obey the Scriptures. “But whoso looketh into the perfect law of liberty, and continueth therein, he being not a forgetful hearer, but a doer of the work, this man shall be blessed in his deed” (James 1:25).

We should hide the Scriptures in our hearts. “Thy word have I hid in mine heart, that I might not sin against thee” (Psalm 119:11).

We should study the Scriptures. “Search the scriptures; for in them ye think ye have eternal life: and they are they which testify of me” (John 5:39).

QUESTION: Will you please comment on the humility of Christ by citing Scriptures?

ANSWER: Jesus said, “Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart: and ye shall find rest unto your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light” (Matthew 11:28-30).

Jesus did not seek His own. “And I seek not mine own glory: there is one that seeketh and judgeth” (John 8:50).

Jesus ate with sinners. “Then drew near unto him all the publicans and sinners for to hear him. And the Pharisees and scribes murmured, saying, This man receiveth sinners, and eateth with them” (Luke 15:1-2).

Jesus was long-suffering during His cruel trial. “Who, when he was reviled, reviled not again; when he suffered, he threatened not; but committed himself to him that judgeth righteously” (I Peter 2:23).
